Dear Members and Friends of St. Andrew's,

In an e-mail I wrote a couple of months ago to my former colleague Howard Anderson, now at St. Matthew's in Pacific Palisades in southern California, I told him about the many challenges we at St. Andrew's have faced in the last year. He wrote back "You've had the year from hell."

Not long after I received an e-mail from Father Pat with a quote from W. L. Watkinson "Hell works the hardest on God's saints. The most worthy souls will be tested with the most pressure and the highest heat, but heaven will not desert them."

Yes, it has been a challenging and difficult year, but I believe we as a parish have been tested and found that heaven will not desert us.

This is a small, but plucky, parish, which has maintained a presence here in Santa Cruz County for over a hundred and twenty five years through good times and bad, thick and thin. And we continue to maintain this presence. We may have been through the year from hell, but we do not live in hell. We live among the community of saints, those wonderful people in heaven and on earth, who support us in a fellowship of love and prayer, so that we know ourselves to be surrounded by their witness to God's power and mercy.

Of recent concern has been our relationship with our Music Director/Organist Alessandro Dal Ferro. It has been a multi-layered and complicated relationship with issues on both sides not getting resolved. In the end the Vestry decided to terminate his contract with St. Andrew's at six months. Many will miss his beautiful pieces on organ and piano. Others are feeling hurt. It is in this context of knowing ourselves to be surrounded by those who are witnesses to God's power and mercy that I ask each of you in the congregation who feel affected in some way that you participate in a reflection and healing process which we will offer as a next step.

Only by seriously looking at ourselves and being open to healing will we regain the vision and energy to move forward in mission.

On June 21st members of the vestry and the budget and finance committee met to review our annual budget. As we stand, it is difficult to see St. Andrew's maintaining financial solvency through the summer months. We went through each and every line item, and there isn't much 'wobble room'. In this meeting we managed to reduce our annual expenses by \$6,800. Also, we have received a donation of \$4000 from the Santa Cruz Council on Aging for

their use of our facilities. With all of our snowbirds leaving, the pledges, plate offerings, and contributions are down. With the rough fall and winter we had (furnaces, electrical, termites, etc), we are not in as good a financial state as we had hoped. We must figure out how to pay employees and bills and still continue our outreach to others. Some members are behind on pledges and this has also affected our summer cash flow. At this point, every penny counts in the life of St. Andrew's Church, and we need a lot of them to stay afloat! As we continue throughout our summer, please continue to pray for resources for St. Andrew's.

From the Junior Warden

First, I need to THANK everyone for all your prayers, thoughts and support in the past two months as I really have been through a lot physically as you all know. My June 16th surgery was very successful and, at this time I am actually walking with the help of a cane. Soon I will be back to walking on my own two feet and back to work. In this time a lot has gone on with our building. The swamp cooler conversions have been completed, thanks to Deacon Jim and Vince Lucero. The cost was quite a bit more than expected due to the fact we had to purchase all new pads, install oxidation devices, and hire Santa Cruz Heating and Cooling to replace the thermostat, wiring and control unit for the preschool's swamp cooler.

Our building is now 42 years old and in need of many repairs. There have been many unexpected costs this year associated with the age and condition of our building and each time we get one thing repaired something else seems to go. The Vestry is moving toward a capital campaign to raise funds for major work. Preschool parents and clinic supporters, as well as members of the community at large will be approached along with church members for the Capital Campaign.

However this summer we need to replace the rear entry to our preschool; it is a safety hazard and also a security issue. The entire frame has separated from the block, and we need to rebuild the frame and replace damaged wood. In July we will start this project. We are the preschool's landlord and

need to have this repaired by the beginning of the next school session on August 1st. Also, as many of you have seen, we have a lot of damaged wood in and around our building which needs to be repaired and in many cases replaced completely. In the past I have asked for donations of materials and tools to allow us the ability to make some of these repairs, but now we are way beyond just needing tools and materials we need funds to start and complete these projects.

I am not one who is comfortable asking for monetary donations, but we need to make this building safe and secure. I am sorry to approach you like this, but we need to do something NOW. The vestry met on June 21st with the financial committee and it was an informative meeting that stated plainly "we as a parish need to make some tough decisions." Are we to move forward? I say YES. As much as I can contribute I will, not just monetarily, but also with sweat and the ability to make our church building safe, secure and most importantly, comfortable for all.

I know that these hard economic times have hit us all, but to continue our outreach missions and to continue with the preschool, clinic, and all the other programs which our Church houses we need to move forward not just for today but for all the tomorrows. So I ask, Please take a look around and see what you may be able to contribute now in the short run. Contributions for the immediate work this summer can be made out to St. Andrew's Church with 'Capital Improvement Fund' in the memo line. REMEMBER all donations to our now, as well as to our future in a Capital Campaign, are TAX DEDUCTIBLE.

ECW makes energy packs for firemen

After attending a meeting about the fires in the Tubac/Rio Rico area, Pixie Geren came up with the idea of putting together “energy packs” for the firemen fighting the fires. She requested and received donations from Walmart for the contents. She went online and got a receipt for these special packs which consisted of a variety of fresh nuts, dried cranberries, raisins, small pretzels and special dark chocolate. These goodies, layered in snack baggies, help provide the firefighters with the 5,000 - 7,000 calories a day they need when they are fighting fires.

On June 4th, Pixie was joined by Rosalva Alatorre, Mary Darling, Rev. Lucie and Andi Privette at St. Andrew’s to put together 200 packs, which Pixie delivered that same day. The packs were well-received, and Pixie learned that cards, letters, e-mails and posters of appreciation really boosted firefighters’ moral and were much appreciated, as they don’t often get positive feedback. Therefore a campaign was initiated to collect as many cards as possible.

St. Andrew’s parishioners came through with many, many cards and letters of appreciation for the firefighters. These were delivered by children of the parish; two of them are acolytes, Alex and Lee and their siblings, Angelika and Anthony.



Deputy Incident Information Officer, Gary Roberts was very touched and once stated that this community is one of three close to their hearts because of how well they were treated and how they felt their efforts were appreciated.

Angelika presented Deputy Roberts with a rose from the altar flowers, which touched a very tired, but grateful firefighter’s heart.

Women’s Group studies prayer with beads



At last fall’s women’s retreat, which focused on prayer, one of the topics of interest was using prayer beads as an aid to quiet and focus the mind. Though using beads is often associated with the Catholic rosary, it was an older Buddhist and Hindu practice and has been popular with different religions throughout history. In the 1980’s a group of Episcopalians studying the use contemplative prayer developed a design of only 33 beads ending in a cross rather than a crucifix. The book *Praying with Beads* by Nan Lewis Doerr and Virginia Stem Owens is a good source of daily prayers using beads. Some of our ECW members would be happy to discuss their interest in praying with beads with you if you are interested.

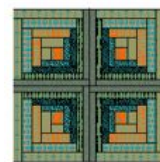
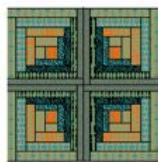
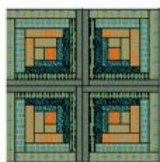
