Dear Members and Friends of St. Andrew's,

We had a cold but joyful Christmas at St. Andrew's this year. We missed some of you who were away visiting your families elsewhere, but many families who had returned home to this area came in droves. Thanks to Sigrid Maitrejean we had hot mulled cider before and after the Christmas Eve service to help keep everyone warm in our unheated church building.

The heat situation will soon improve, however, as at the Vestry meeting in December, we voted to accept a bid of \$11,400 from Graham Electric, to replace the electric connection system to the building. Work will begin just after the first of the year and take about two weeks to be completed.

We have \$5,600 from our Diocesan loan to put toward the electrical work, and we have received another \$1,500 in donations to date, which leaves \$4,300 which we need to raise. Any additional donations toward this work will be gratefully accepted.

In addition to the electrical connection system we need to move the line currently over the Children's Clinic hearing trailer behind the church. At their December meeting the Clinic board approved \$2000 to cover the cost of the additional pole needed to do this.

The Vestry has realized that we have been stretching our finances too thin by trying to pay for needed repairs and upgrades to our 50 year old building out of current pledges and loans from the Diocese. So we discerned the need to initiate a Capital Campaign. But a capital campaign is never just about the building, it is about our mission and vision as a church. This will be a topic of discussion at the Annual Meeting so all members of the parish can begin to have input into this process. So start dreaming of how we might better use our space for mission as well as specific improvements that may be needed and how we might use energy and water more efficiently to bring this building complex into the 21st century. (There is more food for thought to be found on page 8.)

Good news for those who did not make the Christmas services: our new organist Alessandro Dal Ferro and his wife Francesca Menegazzo, both from Italy, are finally here. It took almost six months to get the visa approved! The music was beautiful at Christmas, and our office manager Joan Jernigan and I enjoy morning concerts almost daily as he practices.

St. Andrew's welcomes new organist Alessandro Dal Ferro

If you were not at any of the St. Andrew's Christmas services, you have missed the initial opportunities to hear our new organist, Alessandro Dal Ferro. It is a treat to hear him play.

Here is a brief biography of Alessandro.

Alessandro Dal Ferro, a native from Italy, started his organ studies at a very early age. He attended the Conservatory of Verona, the Italian Academy of Organ Music in Pistoia and at the same time he enrolled at the University of Padova, studying law. In 2004 he moved to the United States to pursue his Doctorate in Organ Performance under the direction of Dr. Carole Terry at the University of



Washington in Seattle. He wrote his dissertation about one of the leading composers of our time, Joel-Francois Durand, exploring the deep ties between music, philosophy and other arts such as painting.

He pursued master classes in organ practice and improvisation in Europe and the US. Among his most influential teachers are Hans-Ola Ericsson, M.C. Alain, and U. Forni. The organ works of O. Messiaen, A. Schoenberg, Ligeti and modern music are his special area of interest.

We are very glad to be part of this special community and it makes us strong and happy to know that we are part of it since this is a very new experience of life and work in a different part of the country and still faraway from our native country. New Guidelines for Coffee Hour Hosts/Hostesses have been set

At the Episcopal Church Women's December meeting we reviewed the changes which had been made to the Coffee Hour guidelines last year. The goal is to have a time for the diverse and far-flung members of this parish from throughout Santa Cruz County to socialize with each other after church. We recommend that two individuals or families sign up together to provide finger food each week. Those who wish to do something more than finger food may do so, but, remember, this is not a competition.

Last year the ECW decided to "go green" and no longer use paper plates. That change has saved money, but other problems surfaced because of that decision. Dealing with the dishes after our coffee hours is a concern. Some hosts do not know how to run the dishwasher; some don't want to run it. Some do not have the stamina or the time to stay to do the cleanup. Note that to keep our status as a certified kitchen in this county, which we need to do because of the Children's Clinic, all dishes need to be processed through the dishwasher.

With those concerns in mind the ECW offers the following choices for coffee hour hosts.

- 1) Scrape, rinse and wash the dishes in the dishwasher and put them away and/or have a friend help with this part of hosting. You may leave the coffee cups rinsed.
- 2) Utilize paper plates which will be available from the kitchen closet. Leave the coffee cups (and any silverware) rinsed.
- 3) Stay "green" and scrape, rinse and stack the dishes, silverware and coffee cups. Pay the sexton, Rosalva Alatorre, \$15 to wash the dishes in the dishwasher and put them away on Monday. To do that, put a check in her mail box in the office.
- 4) Bring your own paper plates, thus saving the ECW the cost of furnishing paper plates.

Coffee Hour volunteers: Just 2 times a year would fill the schedule

The Coffee Hour Scheduler position is being rotated for the time being among members of the ECW. Andi Privette will be handling the responsibility for the first 3 months of the year. Using the sign-up sheet, hosts have volunteered for January and February.

Please see the chart(s) in the Parish Hall. The next two months are on the Ministries Sign-Up sheet. The rest of the year is posted on the bulletin board behind the Church Mouse. If we all would go there in the next couple weeks and sign up for two times in the whole year, we'd have the calendar filled.

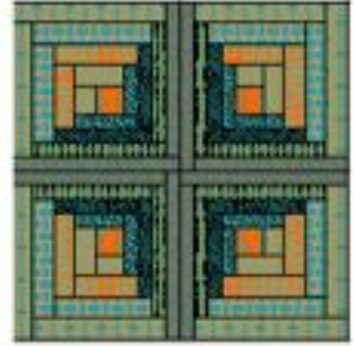

St. Andrew’s celebrates Shrove Tuesday with a pancake supper and some other fun activity, which in recent years has sometimes included a talent show. Shrove Tuesday pancake suppers are the English version of Mardi Gras (French for Fat Tuesday) or Carnival. Welcome to the Episcopal Church: An Introduction to Its History, Faith and Worship

is written by Christopher L. Webber, a priest.. It begins with a short history of the Episcopal Church starting from the earliest times. It continues by examining the beliefs, worship and structure of the Church. It is a good book for newcomers or anyone who is interested in learning more about our church.

Welcome to Sunday: An Introduction to Worship in the Episcopal Church is also by Christopher Webber. This book explains what happens during the Sunday service. It helps both old and new Episcopalians understand what we do in church and why we do it. Worship is the heart of the church and Webber makes this clear.

Welcome to the Book of Common Prayer is written by a deacon, Vicki K. Black. She not only shows readers the beauty and richness of the Book of Common Prayer but also helps us find our way through this book that grounds our faith. We come to understand it not just as a Sunday ritual but also as a guide and a companion through life.

Welcome to the Church Year: An Introduction to the Seasons of the Episcopal Church is another book by Vicki K. Black. She clarifies for us the Church year as she explains our traditions and symbols. If you ever wondered why we begin our year with Advent in late November or why we use green colored vestments and hangings in Epiphany but purple ones in Lent, then this is the book for you. It will lead you into a deeper and more meaningful way of worship.

Members of St. Andrew's volunteer at Crossroads Mission

This year members of the Men's Group and other members of the congregation helped at the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners at the Crossroads Mission in Nogales, serving several hundred people full meals with all the trimmings. The food is all donated, often by local merchants. In addition each family goes home with a large bag of produce donated by the local produce businesses, as well as a Spanish prayer book. It takes several people a few hours to bag it all. The volunteers are dedicated Christians from Nogales to Tucson.

The Mission is open seven days a week, serving lunch and dinner. They house up to 30 people for the night. Guests are given showers and clean clothes and then attend a chapel service before dinner. Chapel service is also held daily before lunch. In addition to the residents, the Mission feeds many poor people of the community. Many of the local residents also attend the Mission chapel services and have voluntarily started a collection to help the Mission financially. The services are non denominational.

This seems like a worthwhile activity to support financially and by volunteering.

Some background information to think about regarding Capital Campaigns

As I mentioned in my lead article the Vestry has decided we need to initiate a Capital Campaign to deal with our fifty year old building and grounds. But a Capital Campaign is never just about the building, it is about our mission and vision. So here is some information to help us begin thinking together about a Capital Campaign:

A successful church capital campaign is conducted in three stages: discernment, a feasibility study and finally the "gifting" phase; each building a strong foundation for the one to follow. The process of discernment calls a congregation to respond together to the all important question: *What is God calling us to accomplish?* With that vital question always and prayerfully guiding the process, good discernment involves:

Identifying your ministry's needs, both physical and programmatic

Involving others to suggest and examine those needs in detail

Communicating a resulting collective vision for your ministry

Start with the mission statement

First, try dusting off your congregation's mission statement. Is it still relevant and inspiring to your current church family? Is it still being realized by your ministries, programs and physical plant? Next, conduct an organized effort allowing each of the ministry groups within your church to dream a little. Create a means to capture their dreams and needs. You don't have to promise anyone anything — just *listen*. Are their ministries being supported or thwarted by your current situation? Are they able to do what God is calling them to do? How could their ministries be enhanced by proposed projects? It is amazing how many ideas arise from just this exercise. (Note: See our mission statement on back cover of this newsletter.)

Guide the process As a direct result of the discernment processes, I regularly see inspiration sparked, relationships healing, ministries discovered and revitalized, newcomers getting involved, leadership appreciated, talents recognized and offered, and faith renewed. Who knew so much good fun could come from the dreaded task of raising money?
