Deacon Skip on Board of First Things First

Deacon Skip Vellom has just been appointed to serve on the board of First Things First for Santa Cruz County. FIRST THINGS FIRST, the Arizona initiative to provide services to children from birth to age five, grew out of proposition 203, the tobacco tax initiative approved by the voters in 2006. Under the terms of this initiative, all funds received through the tax are exclusively earmarked for the health and education of children.

A state commission is charged with developing the policies and procedures for determining how the money will be distributed to the 31 regions in the state. At the regional level (Santa Cruz County is a region) a board of 11 members is appointed to establish the needs and the assets to meet these needs. Members of the board serve in a voluntary capacity for 2-4 years.

Theresa Morales has been appointed to be the regional director for Santa Cruz County to serve as contact person between the region and the

state, and provide administrative services to the board. Once funds are made available from the state, it will be the board's responsibility to distribute the funds to the various providers: preschools and day care centers, health providers, etc.

Deacon Skip, whose outreach work includes the St. Andrew's Preschool and Day Care Center, fills the "faith based community" position on the Santa Cruz County board. He recently attended a 3 day training session in Phoenix. Over 300 people from all over the state participated in the training, which Skip said was excellent. He came back with a new mantra, "It's all about children."

Junior Warden Update, April, 2008

Since my last report, a number of tasks have been initiated and/or completed.

A faulty spigot in the pre-school rest room was repaired. Desert Plumbing repaired the drinking fountain spigot, replaced two leaky external water spigots, and after several tries seem to have fixed the problem toilet in the ladies' rest room. Falshaws electric replaced a faulty switch for the lector-side bank of Chancery lights, and repaired switch connections for the pulpit lights. Rio Rico Refrigeration replaced a faulty blower in the pre-school/office furnace, and cleaned and inspected the commercial freezer in the kitchen. This freezer was subsequently returned to the Church storage closet off the kitchen. Fluorescent bulbs in the street sign were replaced with the help of Jim Fitzsimmons. Motion detector light switches were installed in both rest rooms, and switch plates to accommodate these were constructed and installed.

The loan application to the Diocese of Arizona was approved in the amount of \$30000, at a rate of 4% per year. Our first payment request was submitted on March 18, 2008, in the amount of \$10275 to cover all concrete work and the office tiling done last year, and an advance payment to Falshaws Electric for replacement of large roof light fixtures. The payment was received and deposited. A check for \$1700 was delivered to Falshaws Electric as an advance on a total of \$3200 for replacement of roof light fixtures. A proposal from Green Valley Roofing to carry out roof repair and maintenance was accepted, and GVR was called to initiate roof work. GVR indicated that the work would be carried out in May/June 2008.

Two cleanup/work days were held during the Easter season. The first took place on Saturday, March 8, with participants Sigrid and Pat Maitrejean, Sarah Cobb, Michael Anderson, and Cathryn and Nick Kildahl. We performed Altar Guild duties, whacked weeds, swept sidewalks, cleaned the Prayer Garden, oiled the doors, swept the Columbarium, and picked up litter. The second work day was held on March 22, 2008, with participants Sigrid Maitrejean, Sarah Cobb, Martha Zybko, Peggy Cumming, Jean Windmiller, Richard Delong, LuAnn Ahumada, David and Jean Moehlman, Nick Kildahl, and one other lady. We carried out Altar Guild duties, picked up litter, and replaced burned-out light bulbs in the nave and chapel. Many thanks to all participants on both work days.

Additional preparations for Easter included repair of two large pot holes in the parking lot; removal of large partially-buried rocks from the parking lot near the pre-school entrance; cleaning of the Prayer Garden fountain; washing of the Columbarium and all sidewalks lining the front of the building; clipping of dead bushes in the garden near the main entrance and in the garden outside the Columbarium; and repair, improvement, and marine varnishing of the Easter flower cross.

With the help of Jim Lockwood, the sound system was modified to include an audio mixer that will facilitate installation of a hearing aid loop. With the help of Pat Maitrejean, a hearing aid loop donated by audiologist Scott --- of Green Valley was wired and tested. Subsequently, the junior warden installed the loop under the carpet. The loop surrounds the back five pews of the pew bank

nearest the Chapel. A hand railing for the lector lectern was constructed and installed. The pulpit cross pedestal was repaired and affixed firmly to the outside wall of the pulpit. A new mailbox was purchased and installed, to replace the previous one destroyed by vandals.

Tasks yet to be addressed include repair of the electrical circuit for the ground security lights/ driveway entrance lights/ street sign; installation of a sewer line connecting the church to the newly-installed city lateral line; trimming of trees impinging on the main power feed to the church; surfacing of the parking lot; professional assessment of the heating system.

Healing Our Planet Earth — HOPE Conference

I attended a conference in Seattle, Washington, on April 11 and 12 focusing on environmental issues as seen by people of all faith traditions. The title was "Healing Our Planet Earth" -- HOPE. It was sponsored by an Episcopal seminary (EDS) and a local group called Earth Ministry along with the National Episcopal Church.

Close to 300 of us filled the nave of a large modern Episcopal church on Saturday and a whole day of talks, workshops and panels all took place within the context of the Holy Eucharist.

The Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, The Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, spoke of God's eternal desire for relationship. From her experience as an oceanographer she told us about the devastating effects of human carelessness in the natural world. The scientific debate about climate change is over. In measured words she said that climate change caused by human activity is a real and serious threat. The time for discussion is over. It is time for action.

Dr. Sallie McFague offered the morning's second address. McFague is a distinguished theologian and has written extensively on environmental theology, focusing on the metaphor of the world as God's body. She warned, "This crisis demands that we live differently. It is not just another important issue. It appears to be a paradigm shift in who we think we are." She said that ecology means "house rules". The foremost rule is that everything is related to everything else. We must view our earth as a home and not a hotel where there's a housekeeping staff to pick up after us. Another rule is that no group has the right to raid the refrigerator and leave it empty for the next group or for those who come after us.

I attended a workshop on the UN Millennium Development Goals and a panel discussion on the Environment and Applied Theology. Both were interesting. We returned to the Eucharist which had all three hundred of us on our feet and singing.

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Note: The large wicker basket in the Narthex (the Church entryway) is for contributions to the Borderland Food Bank. Please bring non-perishables to fill this basket. During every season of the year let us remember those in our community who are not as fortunate as we are and who are hungry.

The final homily was given by Dr. Steven Charleston, Choctaw Nation elder, president of Episcopal Divinity School and former Bishop of Alaska. He gave us his vision of a "Genesis Covenant" -- a plan to reduce the carbon footprint of churches, synagogues, and mosques, and their members by a minimum of 50 percent by the year 2015. He asked us to imagine the impact of a unified effort to reverse global warming by every faith community in the United States. To paraphrase Bishop Charleston, what could make our Lord happier than to see people of all cultures and faiths working together to save creation?

I came away awed and troubled by the prophetic voices I had heard. But I was ultimately hopeful that with God's help there still is time for us to heal our planet earth.

Kids at St. Andrew's

Although it took months, it seemed to happen overnight: suddenly St. Andrew's has kids again. “What Did She Say?”

After reluctantly coming to the realization that the problem was **not** other people's sloppy enunciation but my own hearing loss, I made an appointment to get hearing aids.

The audiologist who fitted me was Scott Esbitt from Sound Point Audiology in Green Valley. At my follow up appointment we were chatting and I happened to mention St. Andrew's. Scott very kindly offered to come down to see about looping the church.

Looping involves laying down wire in a closed loop (hence the term) and connecting it up to a sound system so that people with hearing aids equipped with T-coils pick up sound as an electrical signal directly from the sound system. It greatly enhances the worship experience for those of us who are hard of hearing.

The looping of the church became a goal of the Congregational Development Committee. It is a project dear to Jim Lockwood's heart whose mother, before she died, expressed interest in having the church looped. Charles Lockwood and family donated memorial money given in his wife's memory to buy us a sound mixer to enhance the looping. We are most grateful to the Lockwoods for this financial help and Jim's technical expertise in the design of the system.

Scott came down before Easter and helped us set up the loop system. Then a few weeks later our tireless Junior Warden, Nick Kildahl, cut the carpet and laid down the wire (a time consuming and exacting job).

The loop is now fully functioning. The looped portion of our church runs from the fourth row of pews to the last row on the left hand side as you face the altar.

If you have hearing aids but aren't sure if you have a T-coil to pick up the loop's signal please get in touch with your audiologist and find out.

Scott is now working in Oro Valley. We hope to get his replacement, Jennifer A. Pound, to come down to talk about the loop and hearing aids in general. Scott has also promised to provide us signage so that people know we have the system installed.

In recognition of the help provided by Sound Point Audiology we enclose a copy of their business card.

LOTS OF NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S CHILDREN'S CLINIC

St. Andrew's Children's Clinic has recently hired a new Director, Ted Estrada. Ted was born in Corpus Christi, Texas, is bilingual and a border person. He has spent most of his adult life in hospital management, particularly in the Los Angeles area where he was director of a number of hospitals. More recently he served as Director of CIMA Hospital in Hermosillo, Sonora, the hospital which has hosted the cleft palate surgeries for the Clinic for several years. Ted recently retired and moved to Tucson. He plans to purchase a home in Tubac or Green Valley.

As many of you know, the Clinic has outgrown the space in the church. Even the altar area and my office get used! Members of the Clinic board have been talking with us on and off for a couple of years about the possibility of putting up a building near the church, and our Vestry has voted twice in support of such a move. Board Chair Jaime Chamberlain recently said that the Clinic is now moving forward on plans to put a modular building on the church property. The Clinic will bring a specific proposal to our Vestry in May or June after the modular building people have taken a good look at the site in early May. We hope to do specific planning over the summer and possibly start building some time in the fall if all goes well.
