We have much to be thankful for. The Preschool has been doing well under the leadership of our new director, Cynthia Bustamante. The Children's Clinic, while struggling with enormous costs for medications for the patients with neurological disorders (almost \$16,000 a month), continues to witness many miracles taking place each month.

The organ has been repaired and Alessandro has been playing some wonderful preludes and postludes on both organ and piano. We are seeking additional singers for the choir and have been enjoying solos and duos and other musical offerings during this period of musical regeneration.

We are in the beginning stages of organizing a capital campaign to make this building more energy efficient and more sustainable in this 21<sup>st</sup> century, and will soon be getting a proposal from a member of the Church Pension Fund as to next steps. A capital fund will also free us from paying for building repairs out of pledge monies and loans from the Diocese. Free of that burden we will be able to take on new ministries in this community!

You are a wonderful, eclectic group of people, and you have stayed the course, for which I give thanks to God.

Alleluia, alleluia. Christ is risen.

## What is the Endowment Fund?

Webster's Dictionary defines the word endowment as "to provide a permanent income for," a simple, but accurate explanation of exactly what the St. Andrew's General Endowment Fund was established to do in 1998. It has since provided an important secondary source of funds to meet unexpected expenses that arise from time to time. 2010, especially, was a year that made us acutely aware of the expenses required to maintain our beautiful church building. More than \$3,000 of Endowment Fund earnings were used last year for that purpose.

Over \$130,000 of investments in our St. Andrew's Endowment Fund have been grown from generous donations of our parishioners through bequests, memorials, and gifts for celebrations. Any amount for any reason will help grow this fund. And with careful management through the Episcopal Church Foundation, State Street Global Advisors, and your St. Andrew's Endowment Board of Trustees, the earnings will continue to provide a permanent source of funds for our church in the future.

If you are about to draft a new will or revise one that you already have, we hope that you will remember the St. Andrew's Endowment Fund for a possible gift. Inheritance and/or income tax benefits may accrue from this type of charitable donation. Thanks to all of our loyal coffee drinkers, we continue to support the Just Coffee Mission which enables families in Mexico to make a better living than before they participated in the coffee cooperative. We have a new shipment of coffee arriving in late April or early May. The decaf will be the new Swiss Water Process that Just Coffee has switched to. This is a change from the ethyl acetate process. The water process is slightly more expensive, but there are no chemicals used and the coffee loses less of the natural taste elements. Hopefully, we will be able to hold our prices steady in the short-run, but the decaf will probably increase in price this

summer. Remember that Just Coffee is still packaged in a full one-pound container unlike most of what you purchase in the grocery store.

Beginning in June, we will go to summer hours to give our staff a break. We will be open only the second Sunday of the month through August. But, if you have a need on a Sunday that we are not open, one of our great sales staff will be able to help you: Sara Cobb, Richard DeLong, Vicki Fitzsimmons, Kate Hutson, Sally Lockwood, and Gabriela Verdugo.

## Yam 2011

Welcome to the month of Yam! Wait a minute, you might say, Yam is not one of the twelve months of the year! And you are right, but if you reverse those three letters you have the month of May. You can have some fun reversing words, like your name or the names of others or whatever triggers your imagination.

However, we sometimes get important things reversed and that is not good. For example, we Americans often think of ourselves as “owners” instead of “managers.” That runs contrary to what the Bible clearly teaches in passages like Psalm 24:1 which states that *“The earth is the Lord’s, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.”* All things belong to God because God is the Creator and therefore the Owner of all things, including us.

What are we then? We are managers, trustees or caretakers of that which belongs to someone else. For example, Genesis 2:15 states that *“The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.”* The garden belonged to God, but God chose to have Adam work the garden and take care of it. If Adam had thought that the garden belonged to him, he would have reversed the truth.

If we are not clear on the proper distinction between Owner and manager we will have major struggles with Christian stewardship. We will conclude that all the things we surround ourselves with belong to us and, therefore, we can use them in any way we choose. That assumption is a misconception of what the Bible teaches. It is also opposed to the first Article of the Apostles Creed which says *“I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.”* We could also add *“and Owner”* between “Maker” and “of.”

For several decades our church has defined *Christian stewardship as the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God’s family, the church, in managing (not owning) all of life and life’s resources for God’s purposes.* That definition clearly distinguishes the important difference between owning and managing.

So, in this month of Yam, oops, May, resolve to grow in your understanding and practice of what it means to be a Christian steward. There is an old saying that *“April showers bring May flowers.”* During this Easter season with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit we can grow like beautiful flowers that give witness to the beauty and glory of our Father in heaven. To God be the glory!

## All money is not the same

When you donate money to St. Andrews, that money is used for the general operation of the church; e.g. utilities, salaries, office expense, altar expense, etc. This is operating revenue – Unrestricted Funds.

Unrestricted funds may be designated by the Vestry for a specific purpose. These are Designated Funds. An example of this is the interest received from our Endowment Fund, which is controlled by the Vestry.

A donor may specify that a donation is to be used for a specific purpose. These are Restricted Funds. Examples are donations to clergy discretionary funds, altar flowers or for a specific project. Any change in their use must be approved by the donor.

And, now you know.

## Giving Back with Coupons

A few months ago I was introduced to using coupons by a friend. After reading more about it online I discovered many web pages devoted to this topic, my favorite one being the Krazy Coupon Lady website. "What is a Krazy Coupon Lady?" you may ask. Well, we're folks who use coupons to get great deals on food, cleaning products, bath and body products and even pet necessities. As I became more and more entangled in this (rather addictive) hobby, I learned that coupons can be used to help others. By combining coupons with store sales, one can often get items for free or just pennies. Sometimes you can even make a dollar or two off an item. As I've become better at using coupons, I've slowly started building up a pile of items for donation. These items range from food to cough medicine to oral care products. Also, expired coupons can be used on overseas military bases up to six months past their expiration date. Each month, I cull the expired

coupons and send them to an organization which then sends them to military families overseas.

So, how can you help? Most Sundays the *Arizona Daily Star* carries inserts, which may include SmartSource, P & G Saver and/or General Mills. These are where the coupons are. If you aren't using these inserts, please drop them in the ECW box at church. I'll take the inserts, and when I find free and great deals, I will use the coupons to acquire items for donation. The more coupons I have, the more items I can get! The coupons in these inserts are often good for a couple months, so even if you forget to bring the inserts one week, they can still be used (though the sooner I have them, the better chance there is to match coupons with various store deals). When the coupons expire, I'll send the most useful coupons overseas, and then I'll recycle the paper of what's left. And, and case you are worrying about the stores losing money due to coupon use, please don't as they are reimbursed by the company sponsoring the coupons.
