Dear Members and Friends of St. Andrew's -

"Signs of ending all around us" as the hymn says. Winter is coming and our church year is ending in a few weeks. And we are faced with texts in our Sunday readings which seem to predict doom and gloom. And the mood of the country seems to be uncertainty and fear.

And yet, this Sunday's text from the Gospel of Mark quotes Jesus as saying that although we will hear of wars and rumors of wars and that nation will rise against nation, and that there will be earthquakes and famines in various places, that these are just birthpangs. Birthpangs? Birthpangs occur at the ending of something just before something new is born.

As Christians we are called to live in hope, to believe that out of disaster or death or other trials and tribulations something new will come. Christians have stepped out in faith ever since Jesus' death, because his death was followed by resurrection and that inspired the early apostles to go out into the world and proclaim good news to all who would listen.

Our ancestors in the church here at St. Andrew's stepped out in faith many times in the past, as the footprints placed in the halls by the Stewardship Committee attest. And we are being called again to step out in faith as we make our commitments to support St. Andrew's in the coming year, as we begin to ask what new ministries we are being called to undertake.

We have also looked at the challenges of global climate change and the possibility of irreversible damage to the earth's protective atmosphere during our Sundays of the Season of Creation this fall. And we find that we are being challenged by our Bishop, our Presiding Bishop and other members of the Anglican communion to step out in faith and do what is necessary to cut our carbon emissions, as individuals and as church communities, and to serve as examples to the communities in which we live. We are, once again, being called to live in hope that, with God's help, we will make a difference.

So, good Christian souls, members and friends of St. Andrew's, be of good cheer. We look forward to the celebration of the birth of our savior Jesus Christ and to the "signs of new beginnings all around us".

The 20th annual Wine and Cheese Among the Trees, hosted by Nogales residents Lou Clapper and Richard DeLong to benefit St. Andrew's Children's Clinic Cleft Palate Fund will be held Sunday, December 13, from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.

St. Andrew's Children's Clinic is non-denominational with its mission to provide medical treatment for disabled children of indigent parents in Mexico. This clinic is held the first Thursday of every month except hot July at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, 969 W. Country Club Drive, Nogales. The volunteer doctors and specialists see between 200 and 250 children during clinic day. For more information regarding the clinic log on to www.standrewsclinic.org.

Aldo Leopold, an ecologist, forester and environmentalist, was influential in the development of modern environmental ethics and in the movement for wilderness preservation. In honor of centennial of his arrival in Springerville, AZ, in 1909, on November 28 in Patagonia Lake State Park at 1:00 there will be a presentation of his ideas and life in a Chautauqua production at the visitor center. Following the presentation David Brown, editor of *Aldo Leopold's Southwest*, will sign his book and talk about Leopold's experiences and influence on the Southwest. In the morning a horseback ride, guided hikes and a kayak canoe trip will allow participants to enjoy our southwest environment and focus on Leopold's ideas through brief readings from his writings. From the Two Deacons:

After convention adjourned, we left Phoenix at 2:15 pm-and the temperature was 108 degrees! After a brief stop at Picacho Peak for chocolate dipped single cones (which we ate inside because it was still 104 degrees) we continued home to Nogales, arriving at 5:45 pm-and it was 84 degrees. This reminded us of March 1996; camping in the Picacho Peak camp grounds-and it was over 100 degrees. We were returning from a visit with Bishop Shahan, when he basically assigned us to St. Andrews Church Nogales. Why, we keep asking ourselves, would anyone want to live in Phoenix???

The theme of convention was "How many light bulbs does it take to change an Episcopalian?" we heard a lot about global warming, the environment, and what we, as Christians can do. We also learned about many other programs/events, which might be of interest. I would like to share my thoughts on three of these:

1. How to deal with the problems of energy usage and how we might reduce our carbon footprint. I came away feeling there are probably many things we might consider, but first we need a PLAN- and I picked some ideas we might explore-like getting the power company to conduct an energy audit for us. I intend to follow upon this with the Junior Warden. If you are also concerned-let me know. We might form a "focus group" to explore this in depth. Our guest speaker, The Rev. Sally Bingham, brought us several bits of information about programs" out there" which we might be able to tap into.

2. Millennium goals- a great idea for Christmas presents for the last three years we have been purchasing Mosquito nets in the names of our children (10 last year), and they wrote us thank you notes! Episcopal Relief and Development has programs available to which you can contribute, and they are all tax deductible. Remember, your suggested target is seven tenths of one percent of your income.

Cursillo is experiencing a Resurrection (some might call it an Epiphany). Two cursillo weekends are planned for the Phoenix area March 4-7 (men's) and March 11-14 (women's). How many light bulbs does it take to change an Episcopalian? Go to cursillo and I promise you-YOU WILL BE CHANGED!!! I would be delighted to explain more if you are interested/curious/ or just want to hear my story.

The Church Year and the Liturgical Colors

The Christian Year is as old as the Resurrection of our Lord and as new as the latest revisions. By the sixth century Christians had developed a Christian Year for the order of worship, substantially as we have it today.

The Anglican, the Roman, the Greek Orthodox and the Lutheran churches have followed this Christian Year, each making its own distinctive contributions. The new emphasis of our day on worship, beauty, architecture and ecumenism is, however, bringing the Christian Year into even wider usage among all Christians.

As God has flooded earth and sky with color, so the Church has sensed the symbolic use of color in its worship.

WHITE, symbolizing joy, purity and truth, is used on the Sundays and open days of Christmas and Easter, for Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs; for Baptism and Matrimony, and optionally for Confirmation and Memorials for those who have died.

RED, the color of fire and of blood, is used on Pentecost; optionally on Palm Sunday and Good Friday; feasts of the Passion of our Lord and of the birthday feasts of the Apostles and Evangelists; the Martyrs; the Holy Spirit; Ritual Masses for Ordination and optionally for Confirmation.

GREEN, the color of living things and of God's creation, is used on the Sundays in the seasons after Epiphany and Pentecost.

VIOLET, symbolic of penitence and expectation, is used in the seasons of Advent Lent.

BLACK, representative of deep sorrow, may be used for Good Friday and for the Masses for the dead.

BLUE, in the lighter shades, is sometimes used on feasts of the Blessed Virgin. In the darker shades of indigo, blue is frequently used during Advent.

St. Andrew's Sunday School

We meet year round every Sunday during the 10 o'clock service from immediately after the opening hymn to the exchange of the peace. We gather at a table in the Parish Hall since we don't have a designated Sunday School room. We carry around everything we need in a big plastic box that holds our supplies and with the plastic bag containing the curriculum. We have a wonderful new teacher friendly curriculum: One Room Sunday School. It was developed by the United Methodist Church and is designed for congregations who do not have enough young people to separate Sunday School classes by grade. At the moment we have students from the 3rd to the 7th grade We could use some help: regular teachers that would become part of the teaching team: people who would be willing to serve as emergency substitute teachers; and aides.

The Diocese of Arizona requires that any church activity involving children must be overseen by at least two adults who have taken the child abuse awareness and prevention education Safeguarding God's Children. This training is now offered at <http://www.safeguardingonline.org/> or it can be taken at seminars held periodically in the Diocese.

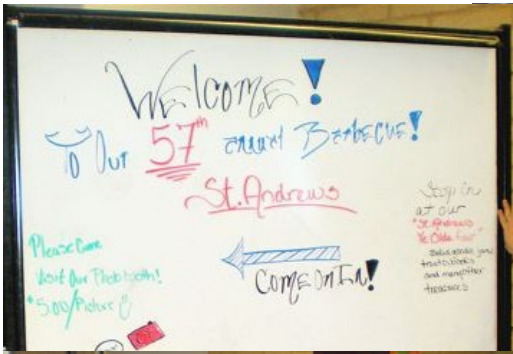
