Message from the Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Andrew's,

Greetings from my brother Richard's home in Nevada City in the Sierra Nevada foothills, northeast of Sacramento, California.

After enjoying kayaking on Lake Tahoe with my brother I went down to my family's ranch, near Morgan Hill, south of San Jose, for a couple of days. As an afterthought I took my kayak with me and decided to take a paddle on Anderson Reservoir, which lies along the road to the ranch. I had never been out on the reservoir in any kind of boat; it never interested me as I like BIG lakes and oceans.

My goal was to paddle up Coyote Creek, which feeds the reservoir, to see if I could reach the spot where the branch of the creek that runs through our ranch feeds in. It was evening and most of the motor boaters and jet skiers had pulled out. I paddled under the bridge and passed only a few fishermen and women as I headed toward the creek on my 'scientific' search. The canyon narrowed and at last I reached an impassable point, a small rapids above where the creek becomes reservoir.

As I paused to admire the beauty of the scene three cows wandered down to the creek for a drink, and, suddenly, in a rush, it all came together, my love of water and kayaking, my love of this particular landscape of hills, creeks, oaks and grass, and the family history of raising cattle here for over 130 years. I thanked God for creation, for my ancestors, for the privilege of knowing this place, and for gifting me with an incredible paddle on a reservoir I had always ignored.

I thought the highlight of my vacation would be celebrating the beauty of creation kayaking on Lake Tahoe, not Anderson Reservoir! But God often surprises us and reminds us of God's presence and wonders everywhere, including those close to home.

I wish each of you a surprise from God this summer.

Junior Warden Update



Since my last report in April, we have moved ahead on several fronts.

After several failed attempts to repair the rear toilet in the ladies rest room, Desert Plumbing has now installed a new flange and a new toilet in the rear stall. We can all hope that this will solve the long-standing water-on-the-floor problem. In a recent kitchen inspection, we were cited for dirty water and cockroaches in the large sink floor drains, missing tiles at the base of one bank of cabinets, and damaged ceiling areas resulting from water leaks. Given that the sink drains are open to the sewer line, cockroaches are probably inevitable. Nonetheless, in an attempt to address the problem, I vacuumed these drains and poured insecticide down them, and flushed it through with water. Frequent vacuuming will keep the problem under control but will not solve it. Similarly, I poured insecticide down the drains in the Sacristy sinks, where cockroaches are also numerous. Hopefully this will discourage the roaches for a while. To address the problem of missing base tiles, I have scraped, sanded, and repainted the cited area. The inspector indicated that this would be sufficient response to the citation. Nothing has yet been done about the ceiling damage.

As of May 19, the evaporative coolers have been functioning. This was a big job this year, involving replacement/repair of all water lines, and replacement of pads in both of the large coolers (parish hall area and worship area). In all, 32 pads were cut and installed.

Our second loan payment request was submitted on Wednesday, May 14, 2008, in the amount of \$13860 to pay for roof repair and maintenance by Green Valley Roofing. GVR completed roof repair and maintenance on Thursday, May 15. They recoated the roof over the chapel, church, sacristy, loft, kitchen, office, and bathroom areas; doubly recoated the preschool and shed roofs; installed a seamless system on the parish hall roof; and replaced a number of skylights that were leaking. A third payment request was submitted on Wednesday, May 21, 2008, in the amount of \$1500, which will be used to make the final payment to Falshaws Electric for installation of new roof security lights. Falshaws completed installation of these lights on May 14, 2008. In addition, Falshaws repaired the ground security light/driveway entrance lights/street sign circuit by replacing a faulty photocell.

We have found that the diocese is very slow to respond to our loan payment requests. For example, the payment of \$13860 requested 5/14 was not received until about Friday, 6/6, a period of three weeks. The payment of \$1500 requested 5/21 has not yet been received. Needless to say, this puts us into awkward situations with respect to our creditors. The good news is that we will probably need to make no more loan payment requests!

Finally, Reverend Lucie and Deacon Skip persuaded Falshaws Electric employees to take down the bell from above the main entrance. Thanks Lucie and Skip!

Tasks yet to be addressed include installation of a sewer line connecting the church to the newly-installed city lateral line; trimming of trees impinging on the main power feed to the church; surfacing of the parking lot; professional assessment of the heating system.

On Thursday, with the help of the Preschool teachers led by Director Connie Cameron, the kids made a banner celebrating all of creation. Other activities during the week included making puppets, taking a nature walk, and other crafts. Favorite games were "Duck, duck, goose", musical chairs, and hide and seek. A favorite snack was Glenda's creation of yellow goldfish swimming on blue jello.

At the end of the week all participants agreed, "It is good!"

The ECW Reviews Its Mission

The Episcopal Church Women devoted part of their time at the May meeting to a review of their Mission Statement. This statement which was written and approved five years ago reads as follows:

"All the women of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales, Arizona are part of the Episcopal Church's Women's group -- the ECW. We exist to support each other in our individual ministries, to worship and grow in our faith, to provide and enjoy Christian fellowship and to work together for the benefit of our church and our community."



We talked about the many things the ECW does and made a list of them. At this time we did not evaluate these ministries but only noted them. They are:

1. Coffee hour after the 10:00 service every Sunday
2. Birthday and get well cards mailed by our Sunshine Lady
3. Receptions after funerals, weddings or baptisms
4. Ye Olde Faire fund raiser at the Barbecue
5. Tardeada fund raiser for the church and its outreach projects
6. Disbursement of fund raising money to church and charities
7. United Thank Offering twice a year
8. Scholarships for our children to attend Chapel Rock summer camp
9. Gifts of prayer books for our graduating Seniors
10. Support of Nogales Women's Shelter
11. Cleaning/organizing and supplying our church kitchen
12. A day-long spiritual retreat during Lent at the Santa Rita Abbey
13. Participating and hosting regional and state ECW meetings
14. Producing and selling a church cookbook
15. And last but not least, our continual fellowship and caring for each other.

We then looked at some of the other ministries in the church in which women take part. We identified twenty-eight areas and concluded that the women were active in every area of the church's life.

Finally we decided to spend some time this summer thinking about our mission statement and our ministries and continue the discussion at our September meeting. Any comments will gladly received in writing over the summer by President Gail Lockwood or by Polly Hyde, Program Chairman.

Noah's Ark, illustrated by Peter Spier, won the coveted Caldecott Medal for the best illustrated children's book in 1978. There are almost no words in this book but the pictures tell the whole story. This would be a good book to look at with a younger child. You can tell the story of Noah in your own words and also find so many other different stories in the pictures. This beautiful book is a replacement for an earlier one that was borrowed and never returned. Let's hope this book stays and is enjoyed by many children and adults.

The second children's book is *Tomie dePaola's Book of Bible Stories*. This is a collection of 17 stories from the Old Testament, 15 from the New Testament and 4 Psalms. dePaola is an illustrator beloved by many people for his trademark characters. The new book for adults is titled *God Knows You're Grieving: Things to Do to Help You Through*, by Joan Guntzelman. This is one of the better books of practical support to help those of us dealing with loss and grief. There are no right ways to grieve so this book shares stories of people who have journeyed through their own grieving. It can be helpful in dealing with old, unresolved grief, too. It is a consoling and encouraging book.

Church Mouse Goes Green

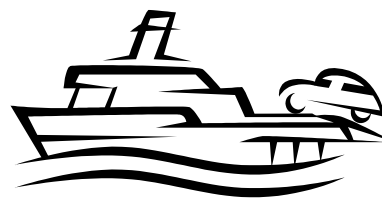

Two Deacons take a Sabbatical



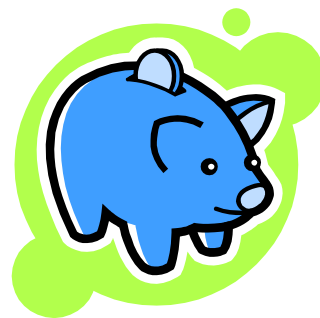
The two deacons will be on sabbatical the months of July and August. We plan to visit other churches in

9. Are tax considerations important to you? Would you be interested in learning about ways of making charitable gifts that offer extra tax advantages?
