Message from the Rector

I'm looking forward to resurrection. It's been a long, cold winter for Arizona, with lots of freezing nighttime temperatures, and much of our desert vegetation has been in pretty sad condition. We've had three deaths of members or former members of the parish in the last few months, Don Hutson, Delia Dalrymple, and Mary Louise Wolter. Gordon Swanson resigned as Choir Director (although he is staying on as Music Director and Organist) so the choir is in disarray. And several families, due to changing life circumstances, have reduced or stopped their pledges. Also the Director of the Children's Clinic, Bob Philips, has resigned. And my spiritual life has been through a dry spell. (Yes, it happens to priests too!)

But there are signs of resurrection all around us. We can see the grass and other vegetation greening up with some wildflowers blooming already. Families and friends came together and lovingly and beautifully celebrated the lives of Don and Delia, and Louise, may they rest in peace. We are planning a reorganization meeting of the choir after Easter with Rev. Rosanna Kazanjian to help us. And the Budget and Finance Committee has found a combination of cuts and alternative sources of income to keep us within a balanced budget. We held a successful Children's Clinic last week and the Clinic Board is making decisions to move ahead. And I've been able to get out hiking and kayaking again after 16 months of recuperation from my car accident.

Being outdoors and active is important to my spirituality, which is very much based on movement, dancing many prayers, finding peace being on water, going on pilgrimages, and finding delight God's creation. I am truly a panentheist, one who finds God within all of God's creation.

So let us look forward to spring, let us look forward to Jesus' resurrection, and let us look forward to renewed life in our Parish.

FROM THE TWO DEACONS

In late January we made our annual "retreat" to Berkeley, California to attend "Epiphany West"- a three day series of presentations and workshops hosted by the Center for Anglican Learning and Leadership at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. This years conference theme was "Sacred Text as Window - seeing one's self though the eyes of another". We were exploring various topics of the three religions: Islam, Judaism, and Christianity.

We met in plenary sessions to hear speakers on such topics as reading religious texts from other religions, examining sexual ethics, and "Moses received the Torah at Sinai and handed it on"-and what does that mean to each religion. We also attended various workshops; building and leading interfaith encounters, differing religious views on textual authority, the United Religions Initiative Today, and The Stranger in my Tradition.

For both of us, the best

workshop was on the United Religions Initiative, started in 2000 by Bishop Swing of California, and which now encompasses over 70 different religions throughout the world, and which operates from a premise that small groups meeting to deal with a common problem, and communicating with each other, are more effective than a huge, top-down organizations. If all goes well, Jim will become a Candidate for ordination near the end of that time, graduate in the Class of 2010 and be ordained a deacon shortly thereafter.

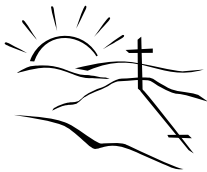

Two good books by the Episcopal priest Barbara Cawthorne Crafton have been given to the library. *The Sewing Room: Uncommon Reflections on Life, Love, and Work* is a collection of essays about the seemingly ordinary experiences that most of us encounter daily. As one of the first women ordained an Episcopal priest, Crafton writes of her experiences with honesty and compassion. I found it to be wonderful bedside reading.

A different book by the same best-selling author is *Finding Time for Serenity: Every Woman's Book of Days*. Each day begins with a thoughtful quote which leads into a short meditation. Barbara Crafton explores women's everyday experiences and helps us find balance and serenity in our busy lives. Her wise words are laced with gentle humor and an understanding that comes from being a wife, a mother, a grandmother and a priest.

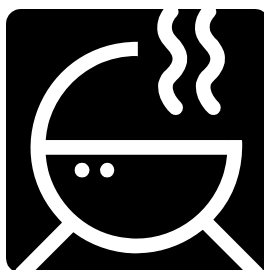
Preschool Carne Asada on April 19

A Credo for Lay Ministry

With thanks to St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Cheyenne, WY

- 1. Commit to Give and Serve with Joy** (stopping or getting help if feeling martyred)
Maintain a focus on serving where your deep joy and the world's hunger meet.
- 2. Commit to Duties** (whatever you are called to do)
Keep a sustainable, Spirit-guided pace in life and ministry (pray always and pray in all ways)
- 3. Commit to Excellence**
Excellence defined as doing the best you can do.
- 4. Commit to the Team** (2 x 2 rather than solo—do not be indispensable)
Where possible have at least one ministry apprentice when volunteering
- 5. Commit to Worship, Read the Bible, and Pray regularly**
Worship, Read the Bible, and Pray regularly
- 6. Commit to the Green Light Approach** (encouraging people and saying "yes" to possibilities)
Don't say someone else's "No" (the busiest people are often the most effective volunteers - don't prejudge their decision - have them pray about it and discern where God is calling them to serve)
- 7. Commit to Being Honest and Direct in Communications.**
Deal with conflict directly (talk to the person directly that you have a conflict with - avoid gossiping to others - avoid using emails for resolving conflict)
- 8. Commit to Gratitude.**
Thank those who work with you on a project, thank those you serve, and last, but not least, thank God.
